2017 RCLS Annual Meeting Awards

At the RCLS Legislative Breakfast and Annual Meeting held on Friday, September 15, Annual Awards presentations were made. The following is a nomination for the *Member Library Youth Program of the Year Award*:

Program: "New Year's Eve @ noon"

Nominator: Myrna Sigal, Head of Public Services

Nominating Library: West Nyack Free Library

Because children are usually asleep on New Year's Eve and miss the rumpus and festivities, the West Nyack Free Library Public Service Department, under the leadership of Myrna Sigal, hosted a New Year's Eve @ Noon family program. We invited local families to our festively decorated Community Room to celebrate the upcoming 2017 New Year. Parents with children from throughout the community participated, as there are very few afternoon events for multiple age levels that cater to those hoping to celebrate New Year's as a family.

The party began with music playing as teen volunteers handed out materials so each young party-goer could artistically design and create an original New Year's hat. Children were taught various circle and party games including the Chicken Dance, the Hokey Pokey and Freeze Dance. When everyone was suitably tired and "midnight" was approaching, we served simple healthy snacks – individual bags of Goldfish, chips, small bottles of water. Pre-cut squares of bubble wrap and noisemakers (our version of "fireworks") were handed out to the parents with instructions to give them to the children right before the ball came down. Shortly before noon/midnight, the lights dimmed and a hush fell – the big

moment had arrived. The twinkling New Year's Ball, designed by Joanne Seward (Library Assistant) and her husband (a theater tech and lighting designer by trade) attached to a scaffold pulleys, with slowly was lowered as the celebrants counted down (loudly!) one second increments-10. 9, 8...as the ball reached the bottom of









the scaffold, exuberant shouts of "Happy New Year" resounded throughout the library...(and possibly to Times Square). The ultimate New Year's song, *Auld Lang Syne* was played at "Midnight." A wonderful time was had by all 94 participants, including many new faces and patrons from throughout the library system.


