Police suspect Ronald Seay, 56, who was arrested on suspicion of felony homicide December 12 after a slow-speed car chase. Seay had been issued a notrespass order for the library property after causing a disturbance there on October 13.

FLS Randall Enos Scholarship Fund

On December 17, 2018, the Friends of Libraries Section (FLS) of the New York Library Association (NYLA)

(FLS) of the New York Library Executive Board voted to establish a scholarship in honor of its President Emeritus, Randall Enos. Randall, RCLS Youth Services Consultant, is retiring in February of 2019, so it seemed only fitting that contributions in his honor could be made to fund the scholarship.

Randall is a founding member of the Empire Friends Roundtable (1992), the precursor to the Friends of Libraries (FLS) Section (2014) of NYLA. Encouraging participation in

The FLS Randall Enos Conference Scholarship will provide financial assistance for a member of the Friends of Libraries Section, who is also a member of a Friends of the Library group at any type of library in NYS, to attend a NYLA Annual Conference for the first time. This scholarship will be offered in odd-numbered years beginning in 2019.

The Reference and Adult Services Section (RASS) of the New York Library Association (NYLA) is proud to introduce the Minigrant Program for New York State Libraries developing and sustaining engaging programming for Adults. Public, School, and Academic libraries are all eligible to apply for grants to support or create programming for Adults (18+). Grants range from \$50 to \$200. Multiple awards will be granted.

Libraries are allowed to submit multiple grants, but only one grant will be awarded per library location. Branches are encouraged to apply. If an award is granted, participants will be required to include RASS as a cosponsor on any printed materials. After the program is completed, a brief questionnaire will be distributed to gauge results and to offer recommendations for librarians interested in implementing similar programming.

Interested in applying? Applications take approximately 10 minutes to complete and can be accessed via <u>SurveyMonkey</u>. Applications are due by **Saturday**, **January 19**, **2019**. Recipients will be notified by the end of February 2019.

Circulation is Strong after San Diego Eliminates Library Fines

San Diego (Calif.) Union-Tribune, Dec. 13

Circulation at the San Diego (Calif.) Public Library is up 24% since city officials eliminated overdue fines on July 1, but the data is skewed by an automatic renewal policy implemented in January. Library Director Misty Jones said it's too soon to declare success. Also, more than 90% of customers are now using self-checkout kiosks, a sharp increase attributed to those who had avoided interacting with a staff member because they owed a fine. With no fines, there is essentially no need to send out bills, collect money, and keep hundreds thousands of records. Jones added.
