Aid, a \$5 million cut from last year's enacted state budget, and \$14 million for Construction Grant Aid, \$20 million less than in 2019. Attend

White House Budget Again Proposes Eliminating IMLS

Institute of Museum and Library Services, Feb. 10

On February 10, the Trump administration released details from its <u>budget request</u> to Congress for FY 2021. The White

House has requested \$23 million in funding for the orderly closure of the Institute of Museum and Library Services, effective October 1. As the



primary source of federal funding for museums and libraries, IMLS invests in communities of all sizes, from rural to urban, in every US state and territory. IMLS ensures public library services for all Americans, helps preserve the heritage of our nation, and provides critical funding for literacy and workforce development programs. The White House budget is largely а messaging document that reflects the administration's spending priorities and has little chance of being enacted in full by Congress. However, ALA has issued a statement by ALA President Wanda Brown in response to the proposal. ALA encourages everyone to email their members of <u>Congress</u> and urge their support for libraries.

NYS Talking Book and Braille Library

The New York State <u>Talking Book and Braille Library</u> (TBBL) is a free library service for <u>eligible residents</u> of

upstate New York who are unable to use standard print materials due to a visual or physical disability. Materials are mailed to and from library patrons at their homes at no charge. Currently, over 15,000 New Vorkers of all ages are registered for TPDI



Yorkers of all ages are registered for TBBL services.

The TBBL collection includes fiction and nonfiction audio and braille books, with over 70 magazine subscriptions available as well. TBBL loans playback machines to those using audio books; books can also be downloaded directly to a tablet or smartphone.

Recently the TBBL librarians were recognized by the <u>NYS</u> <u>Public Employees Federation</u> for the great work they do.

The Decline and Fall of the Card Catalog

Circulating Now, Feb. 6

Stephen J. Greenberg writes, "The retrospective conversion of most card catalogs to electronic formats, and the overall passage of time, have made it increasingly necessary to describe to younger visitors what a card catalog is (or rather, was). There are, however, some of us still in the profession who remember cards, if not always fondly. You needed specialized training to type cards. It was an art in itself, and it

has become a lost one. Specific uses of standard punctuation marks, initials, and seemingly bizarre spacing rules were all part of the catalogers' codebook.".





A desk that predates 44 US states is restored and currently on display at the Josephine-Louise Public Library in Walden! The 220 year old desk once belonged to Rufus King, one of the original framers of the Constitution. It had been in storage at the King Manor Museum, located in Jamaica, New York. The museum hired Christopher Anigacz (above, left) of Double Queue Fine Furniture Restoration & Conservation (located in Walden) for restoration of the secretary desk. Both Mr. Anigacz and Museum Executive Director Kelsey Brow offered to showcase the quality piece at the library before it travels back to its rightful place. With Mr. Anigacz is Library Board President Jason Trafton (above, right).

Rufus King called Jamaica, Queens his home from 1805 to 1827 and settled King Manor. He was an early outspoken opponent of slavery and an important part of the Constitution and American history. King's son, John Alsop King, inherited the home and farm from his father and served as New York's Governor where he fought against the unfair fugitive slave laws. King Manor is now a historic house museum dedicated to preserving and interpreting King's legacy and early American life in Jamaica Queens through annual festivals, family programming, concerts and workshops. This year King Manor celebrates 120 years as a museum – teaching critical thinking to over 10,000 visitors a year.

Open Culture, Feb. 6

Since 2016, the annual <u>#ColorOurCollections</u> campaign, led by the New York Academy of Medicine, has made available free adult coloring books for downloading. The range of images offers something for everyone, from early modern illustrations like the cat (below) from Edward Topsell's



Historie of Foure-Footed Beastes (1607), courtesy of Trinity Hall Cambridge; to the poignant cover of *The* Suffragist from July 1919, a month after US women won the right to the vote (from the Huntington Library).

There are also copious illustrations of medical procedures and anatomy, vintage advertisements, and war posters.
